


Points to keep in mind when cycling


- 1. Cyclists are required to use the mandatory bikeways or driveways. However, in any of the following cases, cyclists may use sidewalks. (Does not apply to tandem bicycles.)
- When there is a sign or indication that bicycles are allowed on a sidewalk



- In cases the cyclist is aged 70 and older, or children aged 12 and under
- When riding on the driveway is hazardous due to construction or other factors
- 2. When riding on a driveway, keep on the left side.
- 3. When riding on a sidewalk, please ride slowly yielding pedestrians' right of way. (Do not obstruct pedestrians.)
- 4. Observe the following safety rules.
- Riding under the influence of alcohol, riding double, and riding side by side is prohibited.
- Ride with your light on at night.
- Abide by the traffic lights at intersections; come to a complete stop and check that it is safe to proceed.
- Using your cell phone or a similar device while riding is prohibited.
- 5. Have children wear helmets.
- 6. Cyclists riding a tandem bicycle should use either bikeways or driveways.

Shin-/Kyu-Karuizawa

The Karuizawa Resort had its beginnings as the place where Anglican Church missionary Alexander Croft Shaw would visit and spend the summer. There are villas and churches and we invite visitors to step inside the history.



Karuizawa Shaw Memorial Chapel

The chapel is Karuizawa's first church, founded by "the father of Karuizawa", Canadian missionary from Anglican Church A. C. Shaw. Behind it stands the reconstruction of Shaw's villa.



Karuizawa Oga Hall Donated to the Town of Karuizawa by the former honorary president of

Kumoba Pond

The landscape of Kumoba Pond is beautiful throughout the changing seasons. The fresh green of spring and the fall leaves reflected on the surface of the pond are magnificent. Also known as Swan Lake, this is one of Karuizawa's renowned locations.



Since long ago, the main street of Kyu-Karuizawa has been bustling with tourists. The area is known as Kyu-Karuizawa Ginza, a reference to the rows of summer shops opened by famous merchants based in Tokyo's Ginza neighborhood.

Naka-Karuizawa features many places where you can get close to nature, such as Sengataki Falls and Wild Bird Forest. Enjoy a combination of activities, from nature walks to art galleries, memorial halls, and shopping.



Naka-Karuizawa Station Kutsukake Terrace

The Naka-Karuizawa Library, accommodated in the facility provides a communal, relaxed environment where you can enjoy gathering information. A cafe bar is on the second floor, and five "challenge shops" are on the first floor.



There are four hot spring facilities located in the Naka-Karuizawa/ Sengataki area, allowing you to relax surrounded by nature while soothing your body's aches and pains.



Ichimura Memorial House)

Built in the Taisho Period, this building was the holiday villa of former Prime Minister Fumimaro


Yukawa Furusato Park



Karuizawa Wild Bird Forest

Designated as the Japan's first wild bird sanctuary in 1974. Here you can observe various types of wild birds, plants and other animals. The nature tour is recommended.



Area

The culturally rich Lake Shiozawa area is dotted with art and literature museums, and parks. The Kazakoshi Sports Park has been increasingly expanded in recent years, where you can do a variety of sports especially winter sports.



Museum Park Forest of Muse

A collection of museums including the Karuizawa Picturebook Museum, which has been conveying picturebook culture from the early years of the art form; the Picturesque Garden (designed by landscape gardener Paul Smither), where plants are grown utilizing Karuizawa's climate and natural features; and the Karuizawa Erz Toy Museum, which introduces the traditional wooden toys of the Erzgebirge region in Germany.



Lake Shiozawa

The only place where you can enjoy boating in Karuizawa. There are also museums, an English rose garden, restaurants, and places to play sports in the area.



Karuizawa Botanical Garden (in Kazakoshi Park)

Oiwake Area

During the Edo Period, the Oiwake post town, located at the crossroads of Nakasendo and Hokkoku Roads, was the most prosperous of the three post towns at the base of Mt. Asama. Oiwake was visited by many writers and poets who loved Karuizawa and is renowned as a place of exchange between such men of letters.



This hall stores and displays documents related to Tatsuo Hori, a writer and poet who loved Karuizawa dearly. Featuring an exhibition room, where you can learn about the background of his life and literature, and his residence in his later years and library dedicated to his cherished book collection,. His novel "Utsukusii Mura (The Beautiful Village)" tells you about the beginnings of the beautiful town of Karuizawa.



Oiwake Course

[Distance] 6.4 km

A station on the local Shinano Railway line. The nostalgic wooden construction touches the hearts of many travelers. Enjoy a wonderful unbroken view of Mt. Asama from the platform.





Asama Shrine

Famous as the shrine where the Meiji Emperor's envoy held a ritual to calm down the rumbling of the volcanic Mt. Asama. The main shrine is the oldest wooden construction in the neighborhood.



Museum of 69 Stations of Nakasendo Road


Experience Edo Period travel, along the route from Nihonbashi (Tokyo) to the Sanjo Ohashi Bridge (Kyoto).



The parting of the roads of Nakasendo and Hokkoku. A signpost and monument stand at the location, where you can catch a glimpse of travel in the olden davs.



Formerly an inn for nobleman and high-ranking samurai in Oiwake post town. Holds art, craft, and book events from spring through autumn.
